The first college will be financed by federal, state and private funds. A federal loan will finance the residential portion; state funds will be used for academic and dining facilities; the Cowell foundation gift of \$800,000 will provide amenities not available from federal or state sources.

The Cowell grant is contingent upon federal-state provision of around \$2.4 million out of a

total of \$3.2 million.

scsc-Couell College

Proposition IA on the November 6 ballot contains funds for the state's share of the construc-tion money for this first college and all funds required for other buildings as UCSC

Actual preparation of plans as well as construction of the build-

itself is subject to funding.
To be named Cowell college after the pioneer Santa Cruz family on whose former holdings the university campus will be developed, the building will house approximately 400 students and will provide classroom space as well as living quartaers for the dean and faculty fellows.

An internationally-known firm, Wurster, Bernardi and Emmons of San Francisco maintains a highly diversified practice which includes public, commercial and industrial work as well as over 500 individually-designed homes, many of which are located in the Santa Cruz area.
