ley Drive.
The Beverly Garland hotel, near the State Fairgrounds, is owned by the the Carpenters Pension Trust for Southern California That Trust for Southern California. That group had lent money on the property, and acquired it when the previous owners financial ran into

trouble. Earlier this year, the union had a agreement to sell the site to ome Depot, which planned to an Home Depot, which planned to raze the hotel and build a home-improvement store. Home Depot backed away from the deal after opposition from nearby businesses

worried about traffic.
The person overseeing The person overseeing the Beverly Garland sale for the Carpenters Pension Trust didn't respond

to a request for comment.

Bethany president said the college, wh Bethany Tom Duncan said the college, which has about 500 students, would still be interested in the property if sale of its existing campus goes through.

"Without that solid sale under neath our feet, the trustees and I felt it was not a good thing to move forward on Sacramento end, the Duncan said.

Bethany is run by the Bethany is run by the Assemblies of God, a charismatic Protestant church Two Two years ago, the tees voted to move sacramento, which tant church. school's trustees Bethany to Sacr Bethany to Sacramento, which would be a more central location for Assemblies of God members. for

of San Francisco Bay A group Area devo Area developers agreed to buy Bethany's campus for \$12 million and build a mixture of housing and business on the 79-acre site. But business on the 79-acre site. But discovery of some unstable soil on the land, plus higher-than-expected infrastructure costs, has since costs, has caused the buyers to reject price tag, Duncan said.

"We are still negotiating with them, and we are probably going to receive a revised offer," he said.

If Bethany doesn't move to the Beverly Garland, another possibility is a 32-acre site next to Capital Christian Center, an Assemblies of God church in Sacramento. The God church in Sacrar land is now owned by land is now owned by the mento City School District. Sacrathe
