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County, City Officials Trek To Berkeley for Campus Talks

Santa Cruz city and county officials will take another step toward assuring the University of California campus for the Cowell ranch tomorrow.

They will present drafts of various agreements for local participation in campus development to members of

the university staff in Berkeley.
If approved, the formal commitments will be returned for ratification by the city council and board of supervisors.

These final agreements—subsequently to be approved by the university board of regents—are a final hurdle in acquisition of 1918 acres for the south central coast general campus from the correll foundation. coast general can Cowell foundation.

The regents selected the Cowell ranch site in March, agreeing on a \$2,011,825 price offered by the foundation. This was conditioned on the written agreements.

The documents to be considered tomorrow are refinements of the commitments made in the all-out drive to secure the campus last

Lewis Nelson, chairman of the board of supervisors, said the five-page county agreement is restrict-ed to development of access and peripheral roads.

There are three general phases:

1. Realignment of Empire grade—Preliminary design work already has started on this federal aid secondary route project and it must be out to bid in 1962 to qualify for assistance.

Nelson said a connection may be made between Empire and Oceanshore highway and he feels this will be a major access to the campus. The so-called "fishhook" road

im 3. Peripheral roads—These two-lane roads will be developed when the university completes its final fil-

campus designs.

The university has asked that these be outside the campus grounds. Nelson said the county feels that in some of the precipitous terrain, topography will restrict the designs.

"They (the university) are going to have to include the roads

"They (the university) are so ing to have to include the roads or are going to have to pull in their boundaries enough to leave us room to build them," he said.

will take advantage of any help it can get.

He will be accompanied by Supervisor Vincent Locatelli; Elmer Swan, acting road commissioner; Frank B. (Buster) Lewis, surveyor; and William Card and John Sandbrook, county counsel and assistant.

Peter Teaes Gook, planning water City Manager Peter T said he; Robert Cook, pl director; Weston Webber, City

director; Weston Webber, water director, and several council representatives will make the trek. The city group has a stack of agreements to submit.

These cover campus community planning, police and fire protection, water and sewer service, annexation, an indus-

trial liaison office, ccoperation in student transportation.

The million gallon water tank beside the present Empire grade road will have to be relocated. This will be done on the condition that the university provides a suitable alternate site on its property. The city will quit claim to the 26-acre reservoir site.
