g winter storms. This morning, County Public Works Director Warren Harrison proposed a longrange plan to place riprap rock along cliffs from the small craft harbor all the way riprap Capitola.

Harrison received permission from the board of super-visors to relay the plan to the East Cliff Protective association and other property owners who are concerned about the danger from the pound-

ing sea.

In the picture above, Granite construction company crews are working on a sec-tion of seawall that collapsed more than a week ago. They expect to finish within a week and then move on to place rock at Black Point, near 16th avenue, where one and possibly more residents have signed up for the erosion protection.

Cost of the Soquel point work will be about \$13,000, according to consulting engineers Bowman and Williams.

Residents contend the ero-sion danger stems from dis-appearing beaches, which allow the surf to pound nearer their homes. The loss of sand, they charge, was caused by the small craft harbor jetty

trapping sand upcoast.
Army engineers have agreed to build a sand bypass plant to take sand around the jetties, but say the pro-ject will take around a year to become operational.
