
Entrance To New Freedom Courthouse




Here is the entrance to the county's new courthouse at Freedon which for the most part will open for business tomorrow. The Freedom boulevard edifice to date has cost the county \$146,-690. Architect for the building

was Watsonville's John Easterly and contractor was Tom Rosewall of Watsonville whose bid for \$139,105 was accepted August 18, 1953. Originally the building as planned in November, 1945, was estimated to cost around

\$65,000. Last year the supervisors spent \$7979.60 on the building and this year another \$136,893.90 was approved. Possibly other bills are outstanding which will have to be naid before the will have to be paid before the job is completed.






County Agricultural Commissioner Matt Mello was the first offical moved into the new building as early as last week. This was because Louis Bachan, Watsonville apple grower, loaned

Mello 2 truck and two men to accomplish the transfer. Yesterday Lloyd Hebbron, Santa Cruz lumberman, loaned the county a man and a truck to aid in moving the

other departments from their temporary Wastonville headquar-ters. They began work at 8 a.m. Building inspector for the entire courthouse job was Joe Knight of Watsonville.



In addition to the justice court, the building contains the agri-cultural department, which occupies the entire north wing, a branch office of the county pro-bation department for juvenile

hearings, the social welfare department and the health department. The latter is equipped with sinks for laboratory work, and two plastic type folding parti-tions, in the latest architectural

style. In one section of the building, are two cell blocks belonging to the sheriff's office for overnight lock-ups for men and women who are picked up in the Watsonville rural area.

Rear View Of New County Building



The county branch garage will be constructed to the rear of the most northerly corner of the courthouse. It will be 32 feet wide and 120 feet long, with a partition between for road equipment and a warkshop. Work or ment and a workshop. Work on the structure was started several weeks ago after steel and corrugated aluminum was delivered on the job. Then union representatives of the building trades stepped in and told the county supervisors the job should be done by union labor and not by county workmen. Supervisors said the cost would be under \$2000 and therefore a legal coun-ty project. So for no decision ty project. So far, no decision has been made one way or the other, and the material remains lying idle.
