Borovatz said, "I don't know where Mr. Johnston got his information . . ." Patton jumped in, "It's not information."

Borovatz went on to say that Atkins had been a great help to him in his liaison work between the board of supervisors and the library board.

Johnston's charges against the two supervisors were made during the Mayors' Selection Committee meeting Thursday following the June 15 action of the city-county library board, which replaced Barbara Bollinger of the Watsonville area with Eleanor Engstrand of Ben Lomond.

Bollinger is in Supervisor Cecil Smith's district and Smith had re-nominated her to the Board.

Engstrand resides in man Gary Patton during public Borovatz' district and he and Patton had nominated her. Their nomination was successful with a 3-1-0 vote of the county supervisors.

was also angry "Because I attended the Mayors' Selection Committee meeting and nothing was said until I left."

Johnston was contacted this morning by The Sentinel and stated. "I'm not that interested in getting back into it," and referring to Patton's remark that the Watsonville mayor did not have "information," Johnston said, "I just consider the source."

Following the airing of the library board issue, everything was smooth sailing for Aitkins as supervisors approved his \$764.919 county portion of the library system's \$1,124,881 budget.

Forbus even tried to add Patton told the press that he \$45,000 for land acquisition to

the library system's budget, pointing out that the Live Oak General Plan was nearly completed and three alternate sites for new branch library were identified in the plan.

Atkins said that he believed library facilities were needed in that area and that San Lorenzo Valley would need new facilities in the coming years.

Added to the county charges are the Watsonville agreement which brings the total county portion of the budget to \$831,419 with the south county city paying in \$54,000 operational and \$12,000 in loan repayment.

The library's budget is up \$106.672 for 1976-77 over the 1975-76 budget, due primarily to the increased cost of opera-

Hot Winds Slow Fire Fighters

LOS ANGELES (AP) - Hot, dry winds slowed fire fighters in their battle against a raging 800-acre brush fire in Ventura County today, but forecasters said winds were expected to slacken and take the edge out of the thundering blaze.

The fire was moving toward Hidden Valley, a thinly-populated ranching region. A spokesman for the Ventura County Fire Department said many of the structures were old and would likely burn quickly if reached by the blaze.
