The house contained the offices of Dr. Miller, dentist, for about five years following arout five years following World War II.

The award goes to three business partners: John Cureton, president of Now Investments Inc.; Eugene Williams, general contractor; and Gary Bascou.

Bascou, a fifth generation baker, can be found at the Staff of Life Bakery when he isn't working on old buildings which is his hobby

The three men put their imaginations to work and decided to utilize the "Dr. Miller" sign that was emblazoned across the facade of the building. The 14-inch high letters were re-painted and the entire building was done in seven colors, creating a carousel-like atmosphere without being garish SCOPE's comment points out.

The porch, with alternate geometric cubes and sphere spindles framing its top, is attractively painted.

The building now houses four shops and two offices, after several walls were brought up to code and doorways were cut through, according to Cureton.

"All these structural changes were made as carefully as possible so as not to destroy the 1890s atmosphere of the rooms," he notes.

The entire property also has been landscaped and two lamp posts and a plank sidewalk

Shops and their owners in the house now include the following: Wimpy's Antiques and Gifts with Dani Ricco and David Downey: Santa Cruz Weavers' Supply with Pam Brouwer and Vickie Farréll; Shoes for Free People with David and Inger Runk; Wonder Works with Christine McGuire. The offices are Yea Productions, a promotion and booking company, and the Santa Cruz Community Legal Clinic.
