The Beach Boardwalk's latest thrill ride, Double Shot, has arrived at its beachfront home and will be ready for action by March 19, the amusement park's spring break kick-off celebration, said park spokesman Kris Reyes.

The \$1.6 million ride is 125 feet high and designed.

The \$1.6 million ride is 125 feet high and designed CRUZ to launch 12 passengers upward for a quick view before dropping them in a downward rush. The park's last major ride, The Hurricane, went up in 1992, Reyes said, though other rides and improvements have come since. "It's a big deal for us and something we're really excit-

ed about," he said. The park's next tallest ride is the famed Giant Dipper,

at 70 feet, Reyes said. The Double Shot drew some controversy from conservationists including a group called the Pelican Network, whose members worried it would harm birds and be an eyesore, but the project was approved by the City Council and the California Coastal Commission.
