

### 133 Held In War Protest

The 133 anti-war demonstrators arrested in Santa Cruz Wednesday afternoon were arraigned this morning in two municipal courts under the strictest security the county center has seen since John Frazier's arraignment in 1970.

All but two entrances to the center were closed and police and sherif's tac squad officers were checking everyone who entered the building.

Sheriff Doug James said the tight security should last only today, and that it was used in anticipation of bomb threats.

Judge Donald May and Judge Harry Brauer divided the case load and granted a continuance until next Friday at 9 a.m. to make a plea and obtain counsel.

Charges against most people were blocking traffic and failure to disperse, though charges of drunk in public, resisting arrest, and disturbing the peace were made against some.

Most people were out on bail, set at \$50 each by Judge May.

Pat Lietky, a candidate for the Fifth Supervisorial District, was arrested and charged with failure to disperse and blocking traffic. He pleaded

not guilty and asked for a jury trial.

More than 600 protesters, meeting at the post office at 12:30 p.m. Wednesday, split into two similarly sized groups and separately marched to Highway 1 and Ocean Street, and Highway 1 and River Street.

The sheriff's tac squad moved people back to the post office from Ocean Street with little contact, and they made no arrests.
