Quake shatters county; at least six dead

The terror of the quake was reflected on residents' faces even today as many camped outside their homes or huddled in fields in makeshift camps. Homes in one Watsonville neighborhood rested at crazy angles, many knocked off their foundations.

At least six people have died as the result of a 6.9 earthquake that shattered downtown Santa Cruz Tuesday afternoon and caused widespread destruction throughout the county.

The death toll may rise however as emergency crews continued to sift through the rubble of collapsed buildings in Santa Cruz and Watsonville today, and began digging through landslides in the mountain areas.

Damage is estimated at \$250 million to private property and \$100 million to public property throughout the county.

Downtown Santa Cruz lost between 12 and 20 buildings, according to county Supervisor Gary Patton today. At least 40 buildings are believed to have collapsed throughout the county.

The quake registered 6.9 and struck at 5:04 p.m., as many people were leaving work for the day. It was centered eight miles northeast of Santa Cruz on the San Andreas Fault. Crews still sifting through rubble

Watsonville neighborhood rested at crazy angles, many knocked off their foundations. One house looked like it had been smashed into the ground by a giant hammer.

Fires broke out throughout the county and the county was plunged into darkness as the power went out. Residents are also asking to conserve water.

Roads were cracked by the force of the quake and several bridges were closed. Highway 17 was closed as was Highway 1 when a highway overpass collapsed.

Three people are believed to have died in collapsed buildings on the Pacific Garden Mall when the quake roared through the downtown area Tuesday.

An unidentified woman was killed, and a second seriously hurt when a section of the roof collapsed at Ford's department store on mall.

The dead woman was dug out of the wreckage by passing volunteers who risked falling debris to find the body.

A second woman who was pulled from the building sustained a severe leg injury, which required amputation at the hospital.

body. Police said that the chance anyone trapp building would be alive.

An unidentified man was also killed by a falling brick wall at the Santa Cruz Coffee Roasting Company at the north end of the Pacific Garden Mall. The coffee company shares a turn-of-the-century building with Bookshop Santa Cruz.

Crews were still working today to unearth the body of a second victim at the coffee company who is still believed to be buried under tons of bricks. Police said that the woman's identification was found in the rubble and that her motorcycle was still parked outside. Police dogs had indicated that a body was still in the building. Crews had to leave the building Wednesday morning as a second wall appeared to be ready to fall. They had dug

through the wreckage, passing brick out hand by hand through the night but were unable to reach the body. Police said that there is little chance anyone trapped in the building would be alive.

Police shut off the mall to the public today saying the area was unsafe. A woman also died in Watsonville when she was hit by falling bricks in front of the Bake-Rite Bakery on East Beach Street. The woman was airlifted to Fort Ord where she later died.

A Santa Cruz County man was killed when his Toyota pickup hit three horses on Highway 1 near the 41st Avenue exit shortly before midnight Tuesday.

The strange accident happened after six horses bolted from a pasture at Pogonip and ran in a mad dash all the way into Capitola.

Capitola Police Sgt. Herb Ross said that police tried to corner the horses in a parking lot behind the police station. The spooked horses however ran from the lot and onto the freeway before police could

block the onramps.

More people may be dead in the county, emergency crew members said. State transportation officials said that several cars may be buried under a landslide on Highway 17 near the Laurel Curve. Crews were also going into the more remote mountain regions in search of victims.
