The OEDP Committee was made up from the County Industrial Commission this year, but the committee has since been expanded to include 30 representatives drawn from local government, public works, agricultural, educational, industrial, recreational, natural and human resources, commercial and financial interests

The report notes a May, 1970. statement from the Department of Human Resources Development that Santa Cruz will "experience the fastest employment growth" of Monterey, San Benito and Santa Cruz counties.

The department's report adds. "Wide seasonal fluctuations in employment will continue. The trade and services industries will expand, but unless there is large increases in convention business, these sectors will also continue to experience seasonal employment movements."

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
