## No Water Problem For The Weekend

The Labor Day weekend in central and northern Santa Cruz County should not be plagued by water shortages anywhere, according to water officials.

Despite the worst local drought in modern times, directors and managers of water districts and companies have been able to ease their customers through the summer with minimal restrictions in some cases and no restrictions in other cases.

Now, with the weather beginning to take cooler days and nights into gardens, homes and other areas where water demand can be high, there is less strain upon supplies just about

everywhere locally.

However, it would be foolish for residents and visitors to waste water in any way until heavy rains this autumn end the drought of 1976, according to Clay Nelson, consumer services director for the City of Santa Crus water system.

Under leadership of Morris Allen, the city's water director, huge cutbacks in water use have been effected by system customers, Nelson said.

"But conservation should still be practiced," Nelson added. "There is water for sensible use, and that should be

emphasized.'

The good news about the water situation came when the Sentinel made the last in its series of weekly surveys to keep area residents informed on the water supply. The series terminates today.

Final reports were obtained

Friday as follows:

Santa Cruz - Clay Nelson reported abundant water provided no wastage occurs. And Morris Allen, the water director, plans to seek support from the city water commission Sept. 13 for a recommendation to the city council that all water use restrictions be ended.

FELTON - Shannon Belville for the Citizens Utilities Co. which serves this area said everything is "in good shape," insofar as supply is concerned.

Belville reported also that Jim McCloud, longtime manager and a member of the Zayante fire department is "doing fine" after recent health problems..

SCOTTS VALLEY - Manager Jack Hinds said: "Our tanks are full. We are just about using the water We produce. The recent rain brought our wells up a little bit."

Restrictions are still in effect here, necessarily, until heavier

rains come.

SAN LORENZO VALLEY Partial rationing relief was ordered here a couple of weeks
ago by the San Lorenzo Valley
County Water District directors. Feeling was that conservation efforts pushed all
summer, plus some unexpected
rain, justified allowing sprinkling of gardens and lawns from
couple of hours in the morng
and from 6 to 9 p.m. daily.
