A bomb scare delayed Cress' welcoming speech by about 35 minutes. At 7:55 p.m., five minutes before the ceremonies were to begin, the \$200,000 building was J. W. R was cleared by Sheriff's Deputy Administrator. Ken Foster because of a telephoned warning that a bomb had been planted in the building and had been set to explode e in 15 minutes.

About 200 persons filed in or derly fashion out to the street and stood deploring the incident while sheriff's deputies, Cal-ifornia Highway Patrol officers and members of the Ben Lo-mond Volunteer Fire Department searched the building. No bomb was found.

Most evacuees returned to the o building after Foster announced over a public address system that, "You may come back in if you wish. There may be a bomb in here. We think the building is clear. If you wish to return, it's up to you."
