

Uses For Capitola Disco Building Passes Council

Necessary hurdles have been cleared for Odyssey Records, a big record store chain, to take over the old Disco building on Bay Avenue in Capitola.

The Capitola City Council unanimously approved the remodeling of the big store, which has been vacant since the Disco store went out of business three years ago.

The owner of Odyssey Records, Richard Bullock, wants to develop it into warehouses and shops — including the main warehouse for the Odyssey chain.

The shops at the building would have separate entrances; doors and windows would be cut into the outside of the building. An auto repair shop would be one of the building's uses, and the council ordered the city staff to make sure that the auto repair people don't get rid of unwanted oil and grease by chucking it into nearby Soquel Creek.

The other source of concern for the council is a large vacant

area which will be left in the middle of the building. Councilman Ron Graves commented that a rumor has circulated that the large unoccupied area is being considered for use as a concert hall or dance hall, and

he said, "do we have a handle on that?"

City Attorney Richard Manning told the council not to worry; any change in use would have to be approved by the council, he said.
