

Liddicoat reassures Aptos Chamber directors

County supervisor Marilyn Liddicoat Thursday reassured directors of the Aptos Chamber of Commerce that she will push for road improvements near the site of the new post office.

Mrs. Liddicoat appeared before the chamber to clear up what chamber president Ted

Colton called a "misunderstanding" over remarks previously attributed to Mrs. Liddicoat in the Cabrillo Times and Green Sheet. He did not elaborate, but said that matter has been straightened out to the satisfaction of all.

Speaking briefly before

chamber directors, Mrs. Liddicoat said she would "follow through with the public works department" on three specific proposals.

The three improvements are a 3-way stop sign at the intersection of Trout Gulch Road and Cathedral Drive, posting of a 25 mph sign by the post office and installation of warning buttons on the roadway by the stop signs.

Mrs. Liddicoat also touched briefly on two other matters. She said she had received complaints about signs being put up by the side of public roads, advertising garage sales and similar ac-

tivities, and also about "junk" on private property.

With respect to the signs, she said that the county has a sign ordinance. As far as junk on private property, she said the environmental health department could order materials removed if they posed a health threat. "But if it (the junk) is usable," she added, "it's hard to do anything about it."

In other matters, chamber directors:

—Presented certificates of appreciation to six Aptos High seniors in recognition of their performance in business-related

classes. The students were Juanita Allen, Marta Moreno, Karen Hardy, Jenny De Puy, Cathy Algermissen and Bonnie Benjamin.

Aptos High principal Don Scherwering, who attended the meeting along with five of the six girls, also told chamber directors that the Aptos Jazz Band is within \$500 of having raised the \$24,000 needed for a tour of Europe this summer.

—Received a report on incorporation of the area from Colton, who said, "It's not going to be easy to incorporate." Saying that the chamber's survey of

residents had shown there was an interest in incorporation, he said the next step would be to get more information. Director Lucille Aldrich said she would look into it after the Fourth of July parade.

—Voted to spend \$125 for a new sign for the entrance to Aptos Village.
