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Board Accepts Juvenile Hall Pla

True to his promise in the morning session, Supervisor Robert Burton yesterday afternoon tried to block acceptance of final plans for the new juvenile hall until after the November 6 elecn his and tion. But his efforts failed as Sup-

ervisors Hulda McLean, Lewis Nelson and Francis Silliman turned him back and later in the meeting voted together to accept the plans. Vince Locatelli went with Burton on both

Burton said adoption of the plans shouldn't be considered until after the election.

He has been the primary factor behind getting a proposition hold- on the ballot calling for voters to decide whether a new courthouse should receive construction priority over juvenile hall. The board has voted equal pri-

After Burton's motion was seconded by Locatelli, Board Chairman Silliman reiterated his morning statement that the "political merits of the pending election" shouldn't be considered.

"There is a contract with Mr. Wong (Warren Wong, architect for juvenile hall) and if the plans are basically acceptable, they should be accepted," Silliman explained.

Locatelli argued that the architect shouldn't be finally paid until after the contract for building juvenile hall is awarded.

But Silliman said architects were paid in every previous instance when final plans were accepted for other county building programs.

Burton then said juvenile hall plans shouldn't be accepted until courthouse plans are ready.

N ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF SANTA CRUZ AMENDING SECTION 9204 OF THE MUNICIPAL CODE BY WAY OF RECLASSIFICATION OF PROPERTIES AND AMENDING THE ZONING MAP OF THE CITY OF SANTA CRUZ.

BE IT ORDAINED by the City of Santa Cruz, as follows:

SECTION 1. Section 9204 of the Municipal Code of the City of Santa Cruz and Section 2 of the Zoning Map of the City of Santa Cruz are hereby amended to reclassify usage of real property from C-2, General Business District to R-4-S, General Apartment District with Site Supervision pertaining to the real property situate in the City of Santa Cruz, State of California, described as follows:

"You people (Silliman, Nelson | plained reasons why he had and Mrs. McLean) voted on equal priority (of the courthouse and juvenile hall)," Burton said, indicating each step toward eventual completion of the two buildings should be done simultan-

Burton then said he had some "important" changes to make on Wong's plans.

Burton said Wong didn't know how to figure out the square footage of the building. "I get \$33.24 per square foot

for the security area; the architect says \$22," Burton stated.

Wong went over cost estimates and the plans, stating it would be approximately \$26 per square foot. The architect explained his original \$22 figure did not include site preparation, fixtures, and furniture costs.

Burton then said there would be no sunlight coming into the hall cells.

Nelson answered, saying Burton was right. He added there that block glass walls will be used to cut down maintenance costs.

"This was thoroughly discussed by the juvenile justice commission, the superior court judge and the grand jury," Nelson said.

Burton argued that the eight offices and nine storage rooms are excessive. Locatelli seconded his remarks on the storage rooms.

At this point Mrs. McLean broke in, obviously irritated.

"I don't see why the board wasn't present at the juvenile justice commission meeting, when it was invited to go over all this," she said. "This isn't the time to discuss it."

But Locatelli replied the time was right because the board is "taking final action."

Wong said the offices are for the probation department and the storage rooms would be for juvenile clothing, belongings. equipment, janitorial and grounds equipment.

Wong explained that other juvenile halls he had surveyed before drawing the plans did not have sufficient storage space.

Burton then said he wants the walkways and grading taken from the portions to be awarded to a contractor, stating the county could do the work itself.

Nelson answered that county and union workers can't be on the same job at the same time. Burton recommended five oth-

er minor changes, and Wong ex-

drawn them. Nelson then called for the vote.

"What is it?" Burton asked.

"You made it," Silliman re-"Oh, yes." Burton answered.

But the vote to stall acceptance

until after the election was defeated, 3 to 2. Silliman asked Wong what the

terms of the contract are. Wong replied his pay would be 80 per cent of 8 per cent of the

estimated cost on final adoption of the plans. Wong will receive approximately \$27,800 for the estimated \$435,-000 juvenile hall cost. He re-

ceived most of it when plans first were submitted. Wong told Burton that he will have to give some of the money back to the county if construction

bids came in lower than estimat-"Whichever way the election turns out, I'll go with the side that wins. But you're giving hte impression that you're hurrying this through," Burton said.

Mrs. McLean countered, "There is no impression of hurrying it through. The impression is that a minority of the board is dragging its feet."

The motion to approve the plans carried, 3 to 2, with Burton and Locatelli dissenting.

Later, Lowell West, Burton's No. 1 supporter in the priority issue, asked if the county has a site for juvenile hall. Nelson said a site has been

agreed upon but purchase has not been completed.

"I doubt if negotiations will break down," Nelson said. "In the event all else fails, we do have the power of condemnation.

Site for the juvenile hall is approximately seven acres adjacent to the county hospital. The county owns about four acres and is negotiating with Helen Nanna for 3.49 acres more through a land swap of 1.5 acres of countyowned Glen canyon quarry prop-

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
