1500 Will Have Visited Public Library

Approximately 1500 youngsters will have visited the main Santa Cruz public library by the time the Children's Book Week Observance ends Tuesday.

Forty-seven school classes, numbering between 30 and 40 each, have signed up to visit the library. All last week classes were guided through the building, where they had an opportunity to observe facilities, talk with librarians, look at books, hear stories, and hear records.

Some classes even wrote essays and drew pictures of library scenes.

Three of the essays follow:
