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WATSONVILLE » Jacqueline Bigelow was eager to get her strawberry dessert pizza.



and hawking purses or stuffed animals, the focus was on Main Street in front of the plaza, where there were strawberrythemed dishes galore.

Though some stands kept it simple with plastic cartons of strawberries and strawberry shortcake, there were others that pushed the creative bound-

fare included strawberry dessert pizza, strawberries on a waffle, strawberry parfait and even strawberry salsa with chips.

The theme of the festival pays homage to the agriculture roots, with the Watsonville/Salinas region as the largest strawberry growing area in the state. The crop was valued at more than \$200 million in 2013. Through the end of July, the region produced 57.2 million crates, according to figures provided by the U.S. Department of Agricul-

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ture.

Area growers donated more than 1,000 crates of strawberries to nonprofit groups at the festival, who quickly turned the fruits into ingredients for dishes.

City Special Events Coordinator Israel Tirado called the event the biggest event in the city, saying the "Town comes out to play."

Krystal McCrary, 27, just moved to Watsonville from San Jose six months earlier and was experiencing the festival for the first time.

With her niece and 16-month-old daughter, she said it's likely she'll return next year.

"It's a lot of fun," she said, adding that "there's a good selection of strawberry treats. Always a plus."

McCrary and her niece were holding strawberries parfaits and planned to go on a few of the rides before returning for more strawberry-centered food.

Other parts of the festival included live music, a carnival with rides for children and a swath of other vendors from private companies.

Peggy Talbot, 72, of Soquel was there with her daughter and great grand-children. Though Talbot has lived in the county since 1970, she's only been to the festival once before.
