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salary.  
He also made it plain that he planned to budget for another appraiser during the county's fiscal year beginning July 1.

"Lack of an auditor-appraiser is listed as a deficiency in my department.  
"Some appraisals call for an audit of large accounts and

exemptions that don't qualify. But I need an auditor to make these determinations.  
"Cattlemen are fudging. Again, no auditor."

# *Demonstrations* UCSC Officials, Student Group Clash Over Speakers

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SANTA CRUZ — Chancellor Dean E. McHenry of the University of California at Santa Cruz, is about to make what could be a precedent-setting ruling concerning non-university speakers on campus.

The issue centers on a rally held Feb. 3 in Cowell College sponsored by the Third World Political Alliance (TWPA).

Howard B. Shontz, assistant chancellor who has charge of students affairs, has notified the

TWPA that unauthorized speakers address the group.

Shontz, in a letter to the TWPA, said that the group was granted permission to use Cowell Dining Hall for the rally and to have Mark St. Angelo, a student at the U.C. Berkeley campus, as a speaker.

"However, it is an established fact that Mr. St. Angelo did not speak and instead non-university speakers addressed the large rally. The non-

university speakers included a Santa Cruz high school student, a Cabrillo College student, and a member of the Santa Cruz community," Shontz said in a letter to Jon Sumida, TWPA chairman.

Sumida, in answering Shontz' letter said: "Consistent with the boycott demand concerning the freedom of speech and advocacy, the TWPA refuses to recognize the authority of the administration in regard to their right to control speakers, feeling that such control can be only used to suppress or stifle free exchange of expression on this campus."

Sumida said that the rally was sponsored jointly by the TWPA, the Black Students Alliance, and the Chicano Liberation Front.

**"All claim equal responsibility for the administrative ruling and will jointly act in accordance on this matter"** Sumida's letter said.

Shontz said having unauthorized speakers is in violation of both university and Santa Cruz campus rules.

He referred the matter to the Student Affairs Council. The council has studied the matter and recently submitted a recommendation to Chancellor McHenry.

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## Testimony Under Way In Superintendent Trial

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SALINAS — The trial of Monterey County Superintendent of Schools Edwin C. Coffin, 46, on civil charges of misconduct opened Monday with the selection of a jury of eight men and four women.

Coffin was charged last Nov. 13 with six counts of misconduct involving double billing for travel expenses and meals.

The prosecution opened its case Monday afternoon summoning three witnesses to the stand in an effort to show Coffin presented double bills for air

Deputy Dist. Atty. James Michael, flanked by his boss, Dist. Atty. Bertram N. Young, questioned each of the witnesses at length about travel expenses claims and payment for them.

On several occasions Coffin's attorney, William Bryan of Salinas, directed questions to witnesses in an apparent attempt to show the records were either incomplete or lacked sufficient details.
