

Navy destroyer will anchor off Santa Cruz

SANTA CRUZ — If you're anywhere near the coastline of Santa Cruz County
Thursday afternoon you'll probably see a 528-foot Navy destroyer anchored about a mile west from the Santa Cruz Harbor. Santa Cruz Port District officials said they received word of the ship's

visit on Monday.

Don't expect to get tickets to visit the ship, however.

The Navy says the ship is docking in local waters for the sole purpose of giving men and women on board

shore leave.

The vessel U.S.S. John
Young will be docked off the
coast for the weekend while
the crew takes leave in Santa
Cruz. The vessel is scheduled
to leave Monday morning

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The ship contains 272
enlisted men, and 24 officers.
Those getting leave will be
brought to and from the
vessel by Inch Cape Vessels
of San Francisco, the same
group that handled the visit
of the U.S.S. Antietam last

year.

The destroyer is powered by a pair of diesel engines and the Navy says the ship will be operating under a "no discharge" policy, meaning no petroleum or effluent of any type will be discharged

officials said the harbor is hosting a big fishing derby this weekend but it can take care of the sailors coming to shore without any disruption

of local activities.

Harbor officials say this will not be the only ship to anchor off Santa Cruz this year. The Navy has sent the harbor notice they would like to send a ship to the community during the Memorial Day holiday in late May.
