New operating hours at the Town Clock in Santa Cruz will begin next Wednesday, with violators who congregate or sleep at the familiar monument be-

tween 1 a.m. and 8 a.m. subject to a \$60 fine

In response to public outcry over a cluttered threemonth peace vigil at the clock, the city's pirks and recreation commission Monday established the restrictions over the protests of several homeess activists.

Tuesday, parks director Jim Lang sad he had begun drafting a letter to the city council in what his

staff planned to do.

Parks staff will make metal signs anouncing the hours and post them on nearby utility ples or posts. similar to signs at other city parks facities.

"We'll probably make several becase I have a

feeling they're going to disappear," Lag said.

The parks commission also will be organizing a three-member subcommittee it creted Monday to talk with the half-dozen protester Several of the protesters, who say they will not leve the clock until there is world peace, stormed out the parks commission Monday shouting.

City Attorney John Barisone aid that under the city's municipal code, inhabiting park after hours is an infraction. Park rangers or blice issue \$60 cita-

tions for violations.

Challenging the ticket and long in court can bring an additional fire up to \$138, arisone added.
