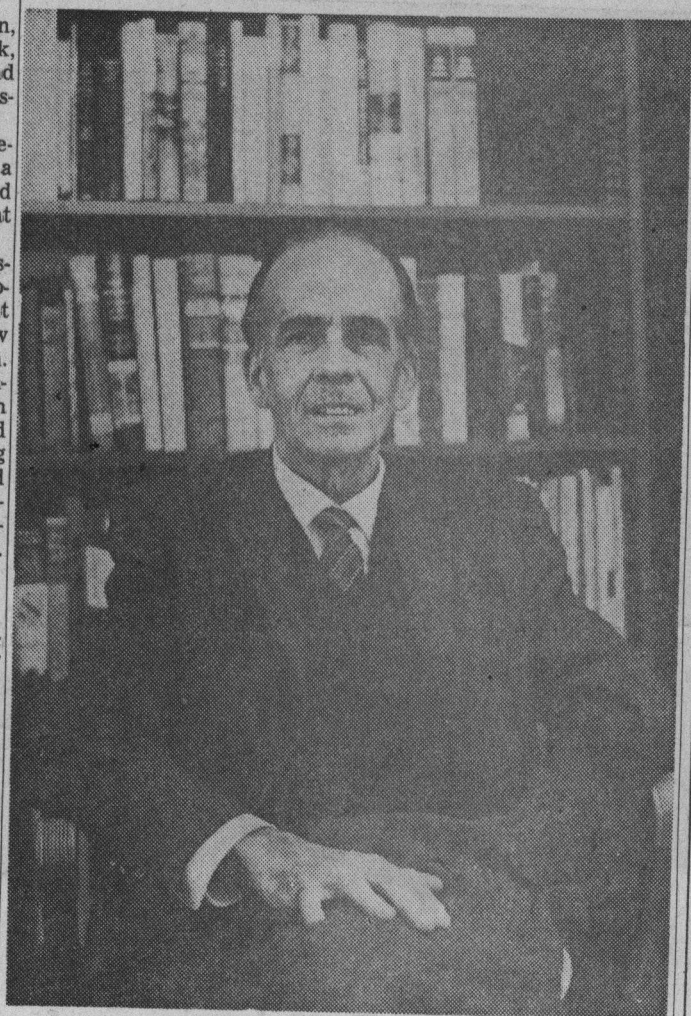


UCSC Friends Of Library 5-14 Slate First Awards' Dinner 67

Dr. Lawrence Clark Powell, founder and dean of the library school, UCLA, will speak at UCSC The Friends of the Library's first annual award dinner May 26 at Facelli's.

The affair is being held to present awards to UCSC student winners of the recent student book collection contest.

Winners are Jim Wilkinson, a junior at Stevenson College from San Luis Obispo, first; Drew Feldman, Cowell College freshman from Burlingame, second; and Wendell Hammon, Stevenson College freshman from Saratoga, third.

Dr. Powell will speak on Robinson Jeffers.

Before his deanship, Powell was head UCLA librarian.

He claims that books are basic to the good life and that librarianship is a dedicated calling similar to the ministry. This conviction has made him a controversial figure.

Dr. Powell has led a varied existence, ranging from yell leader and sports editor at Occidental College to a saxophonist with the Dollar Steamship Lines.

He ultimately received his doctorate on Robinson Jeffers, about whom he will talk.

He used to have one of the finest John Steinbeck collec-

tions in the U. S., but gave it to Harvard.

Powell is a humorous speaker and is presently engaged full time as a lecturer.

Medical Suit Seeks \$500,000

Superior court civil action has been filed seeking over \$500,000 on the allegations that negligence on the part of a doctor led to the amputation of a leg.

Henrietta Lacy has brought the action in the name of Robert Lee Lacy, 20, against Dr. P. K. Gilman Jr. It is charged that the man went to the doctor on February 5 for treatment of a right ankle injury. The action declares that the doctor was negligent in applying a cast to the right leg and ankle which impaired circulation and caused the right leg to be amputated below the knee.

The suit asks \$500,000 general damages and special damages not determined to cover loss of earnings and impaired earning capacity, medical expenses and related costs.
