A shadow was cast over the economic study by representatives of the East Santa Cruz Businessmen's association last night at the first hearing on their massive rezoning requests.

Winter's projections for years 1970 and 1985 were based on approximate 1959 apparel and home goods sales of \$200,000 and \$275,000, respectively.

Realtor Ed Hansmann effectively impressed an orderly crowd of some 150 persons, mostly East Siders, when he produced a letter signed by appliance dealer Hal Burdick that his gross sales for 1959 were approximately \$350,000.

(Burdick told The Sentinel this morning that about 90 percent of this figure was reported as taxable appliance and parts sales — the board of equalization criterion.)

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Hansmann also held documents from two East Side apparel dealers which he claimed had combined sales in excess of the \$200,000 figure.

In one of the few verbal flurries of the three and a half hour session, planning commissioner Norman Lezin said, "I refuse to be a part to any hidden figures."

A. R. (Dick) Hackbarth, East Side clothing store proprietor, rose and stated, "I would be very happy to meet and go into detail with the commission."
