kamp said Tuesday, adding she wants to “be able to continue supporting the staff and the great work that they’re doing.”

The resource center has a \$400,000 budget, funds equally distributed to cover costs for its foster care and neighborhood organizing programs, and providing information and referrals to walk-in clients, Schilling said.

Hinnenkamp’s still learning the ropes, and expects few changes in the programs or operating structure, at least in the beginning. But “I have eclectic interests and I feel like there are so many different things to address in the community, and that’s always changing,” she said, adding it’s just as important for residents to learn to address their own needs as it is to provide services directly to community members.
