WHERE TO GO

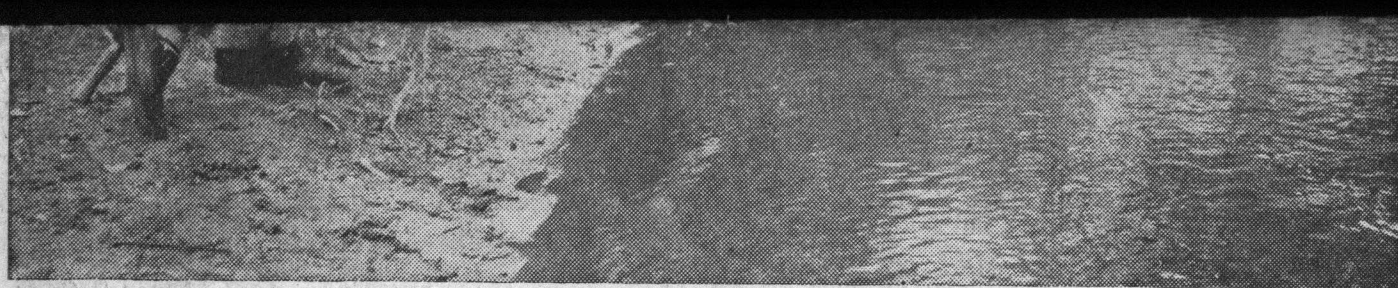
APTOS CREEK—North of town of Aptos.

BEAR CREEK—Tributary of San Lorenzo river. To be planted after June 1.

CORRALITOS CREEK—Off Highway 1 near Watsonville.

FALL CREEK—Tributary of San Lorenzo river near Felton. Planted after June 1.

SOQUEL CREEK—Through Soquel, and adjacent to Old San Jose road.

ZAYANTE CREEK—Tributary to San Lorenzo river below Felton. To be planted after June 1.
