Camp Paradise supporters want police citations 'torn up'

A group calling itself Friends of Camp Paradise is in the midst of a 72-hour vigil on Pacific Avenue to protest the ticketing of homeless campers by police.

The tickets were issued Friday after residents of a homeless camp along the San Lorenzo River let a deadline to vacate the camp pass. City officials have said they

understand the plight of the homeless, but don't think a illegal camp by the river is a solution.

In total, 33 tickets were issued for violating the city law prohibiting camping within city limits, police said. Other tickets were issued for illegally disposing trash near the river and environmental violations. The campers are scheduled to appear in court within 30 days.

The vigil began Monday when homeless activists parked a car with a tent on its back outside Borders bookstore on Pacific Avenue.

Attorney Paul Sanford, a spokesman for the camp,

stopped by the vigil.
