
Festivities

Groundbreaking Ceremony At Deer Park Center

from Highway 1 lies a country-like scene of an apple orchard, an old barn atop a hill and a large field of golden weeds.

Wednesday morning, men in business suits and women in high heels hiked through the weeds and rubble to a spot atop the hill to break the ground for a neighborhood shopping center tentatively scheduled to be completed in the spring of 1977:

The center will be highlighted by a Deluxe Food Market owned by Lou Alongi. Other businesses planned for the nine-acre center include a tobacco shop, Eureka Federal Savings and Loan, the Bank of America, a jeweler, a travel agency, a photography studio and a pharmacy. pharmacy.

Architect Jim Ellmore of Ellmore/Titus/Architects in Santa Cruz estimated that a total of 25 shops will eventually comprise the center.

The center's design features seven buildings

Wednesday's groundbreaking was the cul-. mination of an idea brought to the Rio del Mar Improvement Assn. by Robert Marani, a Rio del Mar resident and community mangement consultant, in 1973. Marani at the time had taken an option on the property and asked the residents of the area what they would like done with the area that marks the entrance to Rio del Mar.

The pedestrian-oriented shopping complex is the result of compiling citizens' ideas for the area. The rustic barn and the orchard below will remain an integral part of the new Deer Park

The famous Deer Park Tavern on the site will remain also, developer Swenson said during the groundbreaking, but the search is still on for
