Library And Adult Book Store Before The Supervisors

County supervisors will be back on the job Tuesday, facing an agenda that includes discussion of a voter outreach program for the Watsonville area, an offer of land in Boulder Creek for a library site and to review a Planning Commission recommendation that Frenchy's book store be closed.

The board meets at 9 a.m. in room 525 of the County Center.

The bookstore item comes up in the afternoon session that begins at 1:30 p.m. The board will review a commission decision that Frenchy's K & T bookstore on Portola Avenue is operating in violation of its use permit in that it is an "adult" book store and not a "general" book store.

An inspection of the bookstore in April by a county planner and an attorney found that the bookstore was showing video-cassette films and had an illegally high percentage of adult books, both conditions in violation of the permit, according to staff.

Staff found that 38 percent of the material in the store was of "adult" nature while the permit restricted the store to not having a "substantial" amount of material that is adult.

Among the general material, staff found that the periodicals offered were somewhat dated, with at least three of the magazines dated 1978, when the inspection was made earlier this year.

Among the general material were periodicals on cars, sports and "marital (sic) arts."

Concerning the Boulder Creek site for a proposed library, land owner Robert Kuerzel says he will give the county enough land for a library if the county will guarantee that he can build something on the remainder of the 1.3-acre parcel at the corner of Highway 9 and West Park Avenue in Boulder Creek.

Kuerzel also wants the county to delcare the Boulder Creek area has a higher priority for the

next library building than the Live Oak area.

On the voter outreach program for the Fourth (Pajaro) District, the board will review a recommendation from County Clerk Dick Neal that he

be allocated \$2,000 to set up a broad-based outreach committee and also pay printing costs for a voter pamphlet put out by the League of Women Voters.

Cost of the pamphlet for both an English and a Spanish edition is slighly more than \$1,000.

On the consent agenda, the board will take another look at approval of allowing kitchen units to be built in guest houses, a condition tentatively approved a couple ago.

Also, the board will hear a report on potential use of vacant UCSC on-campus housing, and receive a report and recommendations on the U.S. Census count now under way.
