Parade goes after big stars

SANTA CRUZ — If you're throwing a once-in-200-years birthday party, hey, why not shoot for the moon?

What would you think about Clint Eastwood ramrodding the Wells Fargo stagecoach down Cedar Street behind bicentennial parade Grand Marshal Tom Selleck?

It may be a pipe dream, but Dorothy Franks and other organizers of the bicentennial celebration on Oct. 5 figure it's worth a few telephone calls.

Among the more down-to-earth plans, 15 marching bands — the most ever for a Mission Fiesta parade — already have expressed an interest in the Santa Cruz event.

"It will be an extension of past Mission Fiesta parades, but grander ... to encompass the Santa Cruz bicentennial," said Franks, parade organizer, during a committee meeting Wednesday.

"It may be wall-to-wall marching bands," said Lisa McGinnis, a special events coordinator for the city.

In addition, a Chinese Lion Dance group (maybe with firecrackers) has committed to the parade, said Franks.

She said more equestrian entries might be enticed to join in because the parade review stand will include a member of the Independent

In addition, the best entries in all categories will receive a cash prize for the first time. Ribbons will go

to second- and third-place winners.
Franks said the parade also is trying to get cultural groups to take part to give the day the historical tilt a 200th birthday party should have.

Arts and crafts booths must have a period theme in keeping with the celebration, and there also will be

food and information booths.

There also will be a few exhibits up at the Adobe Mission, in addition to tours of the recently refurbished historic mission building.

These activities will be coordinated by the Adobe Coalition.

Live entertainment will be offered at both sites, and a shuttle bus will ferry people back and

forth.

As an early installment in the bicentennial celebration, the Tall Ship California will dock in Santa

Cruz on July 4.
