Crowd descends on beach

Like groundhogs crawling from rainsoaked burrows, people in Santa Cruz and the Bay Area emerged squinting and

blinking into the sunlight Saturday.

But instead of jumping back under cover when they saw shadows, they jumped into their cars and headed to the beach to spend three sunny, spring-like vacation days.

The Seaside Co. reports between 20,000 and 30,000 people visited the Boardwalk over the weekend. An accurate count of state beach visitors was unavailable, but rangers said all beaches were full to overflowing.

There were no major traffic accidents or crime, despite traffic that clogged streets and highways and the crowds packing the beaches.

There were, however, at least five rescue efforts, and one was unsuccessful.

A woman who apparently drowned Saturday in the churning surf off Davenport was identified by by coroner's office Monday as Teresa Brown, 35, of Santa

Witnesses reported Brown was hit by by a large wave as she played in the surf, and was carried out to sea calling for help. Despite efforts by swimmers and a Coast Guard helicopter, the body was not recovered.

Investigators made the identification through property left in her car, the keys for which were found in her clothes on the beach.

Three surfers lost their boards at Natural Bridges State Beach Saturday and were rescued in a joint effort by the Coast Guard and the Santa Cruz Fire Depart-ment, and a 13-year-old Morgan Hill boy was pulled from the surf at Sunset State Beach by a lifeguard Monday.
