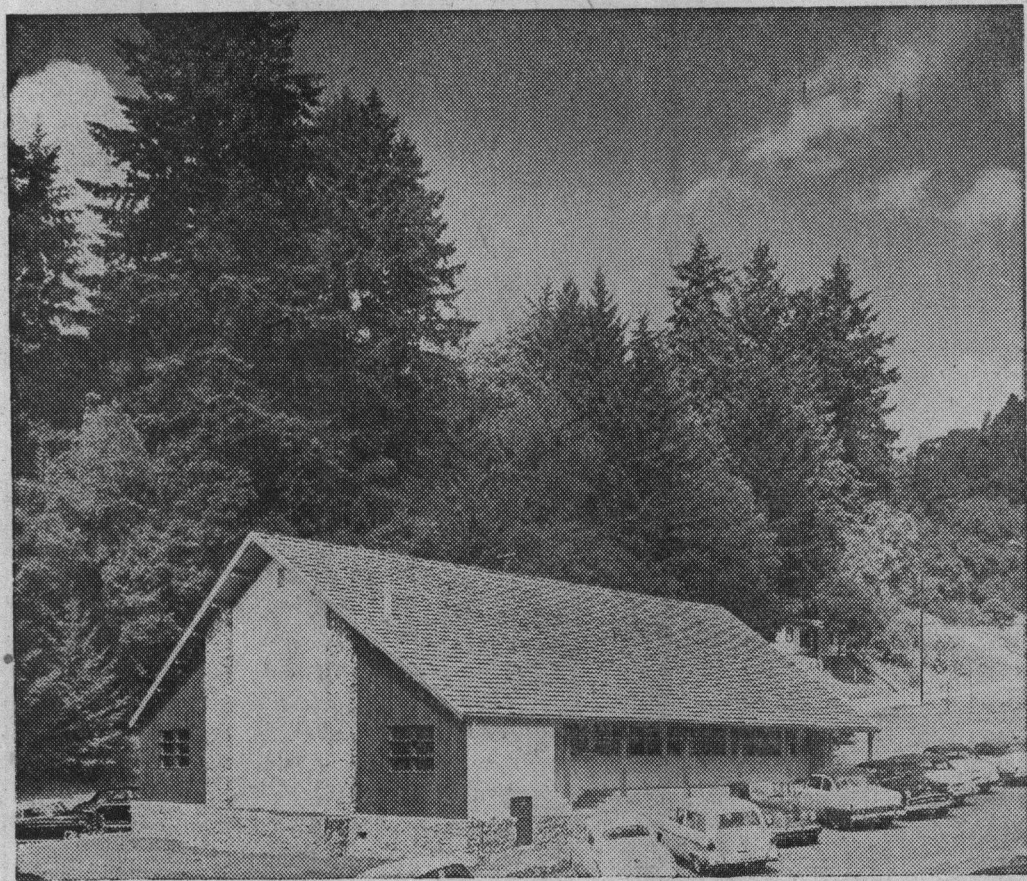

## Bethany Bible College Has New Chapel



## Bethany Bible College Will Dedicate Chapel Tomorrow

The new Craig Memorial chapel of Bethany Bible college will be dedicated at a special ceremony at 2:30 p.m. tomorrow.

Dr. Leland R. Keys, president of the school, will deliver the dedication address. The chapel, part of the college's expansion program, is an attractive structure of redwood and stucco and will seat 340 persons. Construction of the building began last fall.

A new building was necessary because the expanding library crowded into the old chapel. People throughout northern Cali-

fornia contributed funds for the construction of the new library.

The chapel has been designated as a memorial to the founder of the college, Rev. Robert J. Craig. The interior of the chapel has vaulted laminated arches which are exposed and done in a natural finish. Blonde mahogany panels form the walls of the simple interior. Modern lighting, direct and indirect, has been installed. The shake roof blends with the towering redwoods on the campus. Wall to wall carpeting and cherry wood pews are some of the features of the new building.

Rev. and Mrs. Craig founded the school in 1919 in San Francisco. The founders, who established a rescue mission among the
