She is the mother of three sons. One is in the Coast Guard, another attends the School of Architecture at Arizona State University and the third is a student at Harbor High School.

She attended Stanford University, San Francisco State College where she took art education, painting, etching and political science; and earned the Bachelor of Fine Arts degree at San Francisco Art Institute.

She earned an Adult Education Certificate at the University of California Extension and will be a UCSC extension lecturer.

She has exhibited in shows and galleries in Los Gatos, Saratoga, Santa Clara, San Jose, Santa Cruz and San Francisco and has served as a show judge.
