City, County Join Hands UCSC- History To Battle For UC Campus

Groundwork was laid last night for formal city-county cooperation in the quest of a University of California central coast campus on the Cowell ranch site.

Six councilmen and the full board of supervisors appeared in complete accord as they agreed on the following points:

1. Split cost (estimated at \$20,-000) of a site development and surrounding land use plan.

2. Retain architects Campbell and Wong of San Francisco as consultants.

3. Designated City Manager Peter Tedesco and County Administrative Officer Richard O'Reilly as coordination officers.

4. Outlined broad areas of responsibility for the two agencies.

The planning study has been requested by the university regents for their December meeting. The regents agreed to pay half the cost if the Cowell site is not selected.

City-county cooperation will be required in most areas, it was

agreed last night. The city will bear primary responsibility for planning water and sewer improvements. It was pointed out that actual improvements might be financed by revenue bonds. The county will prepare soils reports.

Roads and streets were recognized as the major problem facing local governments in connection with a university development. Cooperation in financing these was agreed upon.

Councilmen and supervisors were informed last night they will have to approve resolutions of general intention on the utilities, major streets, schools, zoning and control of development on the periphery of the campus site for submission with the site study.
