

Is the Cabrillo Music Festival poised to hit a mid-life crisis?

The famous two-week festival — which has become one of the most acclaimed events of its kind in the world — hits the big Four-Oh this summer, and we're left to wonder when it's going to embrace the music-festival equivalent of the new red sports car.

Maybe it's already happening. Continuing a trend of recent years, the CabMuFest is bringing a dash of theatricality to Santa Cruz, this year in the form of Mark Adamo's hit opera "Little Women," based on Louisa May Alcott's famous novel.

Yet "Little Women" isn't the only stone on the festival's gaudy new pinky ring.

The Kronos Quartet, the most popular newmusic quartet in the world, will be on hand for a special benefit show.

Long-time CMF stalwart, composer Christopher Rouse, gets a night to step into the spotlight.

Plus, one of the most exciting performers on the world stage, Grammy Award-winning percussionist Evelyn Glennie will be the highlight of the festival's second weekend

And all this is before CabMuFest makes its trip
to the Mission San Juan Bautista, often the most

popular concert of the festival.

Yeah, it's an ambitious slate. But you only turn
40 once.

'Little Women'

Composer Mark Adamo's adaptation of Louisa May Alcott's 19th century novel made its debut at the Houston Grand Opera in 1998.

All About Rouse

Composer Christopher Rouse, as much an August staple in Santa Cruz as morning fog, gets the star treatment in this concert dedicated to his work.

The concert, under the direction of Marin Alsop, features four Rouse compositions including two West Coast premieres.

Kronos Quartet

This incomparable group is as responsible for the popularity of new classical repertoire as any single

artist. The amazingly creative quartet presents the CabMuFest with a special 40th birthday present, a solo recital that serves as a benefit for the festival.

The annual CMF benefit concert takes place at a magnificent site on Soquel Creek, featuring chamber music led by festival concertmaster Yumi Hwang-Williams, along with food and wine from local chefs and vintners.

Scottish percussionist Evelyn Glennie has become one of the foremost performers in the world and makes her CMF debut performing Michael Daughtery's composition "UFO."

Music at the Mission

The festival travels down to San Juan Bautista for its final day, with two concerts at the fabulous and lovely Mission San Juan Bautista.

Evelyn Glennie will be on hand in collaboration with the CMF Orchestra playing selections by Michael Daughtery, Thea Musgrave and John Corigliano (Corigliano's "Symphony No. 2," which won the 2001 Pulitzer Prize).

■ Sunday, Aug. 11. Two performances at 4 and 8 p.m.

There are also free open rehearsals at the Civic, weekdays at 10 a.m. beginning July 29. Also pre-concert talks, composers' workshops and more.
