

New Campus Proposal Hits Snag

A University of California proposal that \$3 million be provided in the 1960-61 budget for development and acquisition costs for the proposed three new general campuses was delayed yesterday by action in an assembly ways and means subcommittee hearing.

The proposal was referred to the entire ways and means committee for action without recommendation from the subcommittee.

Assemblyman Glenn Coolidge told The Sentinel that he proposed the approval of the UC request, but his motion was substituted by a motion from Assemblyman Winton that the matter be referred to the entire committee.

Although Coolidge said the voice vote was 3 to 2 against the Winton motion, the chairman, Assemblyman Thomas Rees of Los Angeles, declared the motion carried.

Coolidge said he believed the full ways and means committee would approve the UC request at a later date.

Rees said that the governor's office wanted the delay due to a "little ambiguity" on the matter.

Vice President James Corley of the university said that the plans for the \$3 million appropriation carried a condition: That none of the money would be spent on the proposed campus in Santa Clara or Santa Cruz counties until there had been a conference on the entire proposal between the governor, US regents, the department of finance and legislators in the area.

Coolidge said today that the believe the \$3 million program still had the approval of the governor's office. The proposal is scheduled to go before a senate finance subcommittee this week.

Meanwhile, the proposed master plan for higher education ran into trouble at a hearing of the senate education committee.

Action on the proposal, co-authored by Senator Don Grunsky of Watsonville, was delayed because of a series of amendments proposed by Senator George Miller of Contra Costa county.

The amendments would make considerable changes in the proposed constitutional amendment to carry out the recommendations of the master plan for higher education in the state.

The committee decided to postpone action until their meeting next Tuesday.
