Poet goes to inaugural

SANTA CRUZ — Santa Cruz poet Don Eischen, whose words often deal with society and the environment, has been asked to read at the inaugural celebration of President Clinton.

He is expected to read his poems in the inaugural ceremony as well as participate in "Celebrating the Journey," one of many events taking place in Washington, D.C. next week to mark the beginning of Clinton's second term.

"My poetry has a lot to do with society, with society in this blooming age," Eischen said, sitting in his

Westside home.

His poems have included memories of feeding the hungry and descriptions of a woman who sits on a grape.

A former college English teacher, he is friendly and laughs easily. Eischen is quick to tell stories about growing up one of six boys in his large family.

Although a Republican, he has supported the Democratic president the last two elections. He has said that if Clinton won a second term, he would officially become a Democrat.

The two men met in 1992 when Clinton was on the West Coast, campaign-

ing for office.

Eischen then wrote a poem about

Clinton's election victory.

"It was like a new birth to politics," he said. "I was so tired of hearing the same old thing time after time. Here was a new voice."

Eischen visited the White House in 1994 as part of the "Poetry for Peace"

program.

He is keeping secret the poem he

will read at the inaugural.

He said he thinks he will read a new poem he wrote about a blind student's quest for knowledge and understanding.

At the "Celebrating the Journey" ceremony, he expects to read his humorous "The Purple Grape: Disaster to Triumph" and "Bill Clinton: Election Night 1992."


The son of a San Joaquin Valley grape farmer, Eischen has written
