More than \$1.4 million has been raised so far to help pay for Dominican Santa Cruz Hospital's \$20-million, 115-bed expansion.

The contributions in the form of cash donations and pledges to the capital fund drive being conducted to the Dominican Hospital Foundation were announced Thursday by Ernest Dillon, its president, at the Foundation's annual banquet at Aptos Seascape.

The news was received with cheers and applause by some 160 members and friends.

But Robert Swenson and Carl Conelly, cochairmen of the Foundation's fund-raising drive, made it clear they expect to raise much more money in the public phase of the drive that begins today.

The Foundation has pledged to raise at least \$2 million of the total \$20 million needed.

"With Ernie and Al Castagnola, Foundation executive director, as the catalyst," Conelly said, "I wouldn't be surprised if we raised \$3 million."

Swenson said: "You can be very sure that we will be approaching our purveyors and contractors, our businesses and our industries."

Earlier this week Dillon had reported that for every dollar raised by the Foundation, Dominican will save three dollars over the 30year financing period. "If we can raise \$3 million, they can save \$9 million," Dillon said.

finally put an end to the reporting of 22 cents as part of the total money received. He did that by jumping up and giving 78 cents to Conelly to complete another dollar.

The advance campaign was conducted "in house," meaning among persons associated with the hospital. The Dominican Auxiliary pledged \$250,000, employees \$125,000, the medical-dental staff \$500,000, the Foundation and board members \$500,000. Included in the latter total was some \$160,000 from the hospital and Foundation boards of directors.

Now the general public will be given an opportunity to join what Dominican terms "a growing partnership" of the hospital and the people it serves.

"For 40 years the Adrian Dominican Sisters and the people of this area have been partners in health," Dillon said. "This expansion is the maturing of our growing partnership."

The Foundation members and friends came early and staved late and heard gratifying reports about the accomplishments of the Foundation during the past year. Dillon called it "the greatest year in the history of the Foundation." He said the Foundation had received some \$1.09 million for the hospital.

The Foundation sponsored monthly health screening clinics free to the public, instituted a new cancer therapy program, sponsored the Focus on Health film series attended by thousands here, sponsored Project SAVE in conjunction with the Live Oak Senior Center conducted estate pinning seminars. Dillon said.
