Young and old alike gathered to pay tribute to a man who will live forever in their hearts.

He is Clinton Earl "Doc" Fehliman, the 89-years-young living legend. He went to watch a basketball game Friday night and folks insisted on naming the gym after him.

Forever, Santa Cruz High's gymnasium will be known as Fehliman Gym in honor of the man who is the guiding light of the school's alumni association.

The instant 'Doc' walked in Friday night, he was given a standing ovation by a standing-room-only crowd of some 1,800 people - young and old alike - who had come for one united purpose, namely to honor this giant of a man.

Fehliman, who taught 301/2 years at Santa Cruz High beginning in 1923, has been the official timer at every home football game here since 1925 and has built the SCHS alumni association into the most unique in California, was honored prior to the Santa Cruz-Marello Prep varsity basketball game. And the Cardinals responded by winning a thriller, 57-55.

As soon as the junior varsity game ended - it fittingly was an overtime contest that "Doc" watched appreciatively - the school's award-winning Big Red Band marched out and gave Fehliman a special


performance. Principal Jim Coulter introduced student body president Pam Mills. who was interrupted by applause several times as she spoke of "Doc" and all he has done for the school and its graduates. "What we really would like to say," she concluded, "is we love you right back, Doc, and thank you so much From this moment on, this gym will be known as Fehliman Gym."

Those words had no sooner escaped her mouth when for the umpteenth time "Doc" was given a standing ovation. Peoples' hands were red and sore from clapping so enthusiastically, but they loved it.

Fehliman received an honorary letterman's jacket and Coulter read a special proclamation from City of Santa Cruz Mayor John Mahaney. Doc's voice rang loud and clear as he thanked everyone connected with his special night. Players from both the Santa Cruz and Marello Prep teams walked over to shake his hand. It all seemed enough to make a grown man cry and some did.

As people filed out of Fehliman Gym after the game, some of this year's SCHS students — smiling and shaking their heads at the evening's drama - were overheard exclaiming, "Well, we won this one for
