Happy Valley was the eleventh district in Santa Cruz county to build a school. Temporary quart-ers were used for several years in

the then wilderness area along what is now Branciforte drive.

Then a group of neighbors who had a way with the hammer and saw built a school in 1865.

mer and saw built a school in 1865.

There are several graduates of this first school living in the Happy Valley area. They include: Vera and Phyliss Thomas, both former teachers; Charles and Sam Bachelder; Thomas Oliver, bookkeeper for the Central One-Stop garage. Former teachers of the first school house were Marjory March, Maude Stevens, Phyliss Thomas, Edith Fikes, Janie Stocking and Etha Rostron.

Mrs. La Salle Bachelder and Fred Heitmeyer, still active in the community today, were members of the board of directors which decided that the time had come to build a new school — the present one at 3875 Branciforte drive. It was built on the same site as the old one, in 1921.

Mrs. Bachelder started to teach in the school before it was entirely finished. She had 21 students and continued to teach to the teach.

Some of the graduates in the district are: Helen Oliver, Tom Tilden, Mrs. Delucchi, John and Laurence Oneto, Ben Cahill, Albert Delucchi and Steve Buffon. The Tildens' and Delucchis' offspring also attended the school.
Over the years Miss Ida Hammond, Mrs. Ruth Clough and Mrs. Marion McCullam taught singing and orchestra at the school.

As the attendance increased Mrs. Charles Larsen became the second teacher. After Mrs. Bachelder's retirement in 1958, Mrs. Clough became teacher-principal. There are now three teachers; Mrs. Clough, Miss Matilda Korver and Mrs. Evelvn Orr.

For many years the school has been the heart of the community. It is a gathering place for a 4-H club, Cub scouts, boy scouts, Brownies, community club, Branciforte volunteer fire department, Mothers' club, Grange and Farm Bureau.

Formerly a one-room building, a half-room has been added to one side and a sliding partition has been erected to accommodate three classes totaling 58 children.

The proposed school, if approved, will be constructed about a half-mile south of the present one.

The action by Harris, who was instrumental in the early stages of planning the Newell Creek dam and reservoir project, stems from the board bypassing the recommendation of the consulting engineers.
