# Master Plan Committee Endorses Proposal For Civic Center-Library

6-21-60

A civic center proposal with the library located in the Locust-Center-Union street block was heartily endorsed by the Santa Cruz of Tomorrow master plan group last night.

Some reservations were expressed on downtown pedestrian mall suggestions, also in the public and quasi-public sub-committee civic center report.

Proposals to widen the mid-

portions of the municipal wharf to concentrate parking in the key commercial area received approval of the master plan group, although it suggested that phasing and traffic circulation be left to the city technical staff.

This discussion by the committee as a whole was on reports presented two weeks ago.

Final reports were given by the industrial and trafficways groups,

with critique set for July 11.

The industrial report recommended that future industrial development be restricted to River street and western city limits areas, with service and warehousing functions emphasized in the former.

Expansion of the western city limits to provide a 1200-acre land reserve was deemed necessary in the report, submitted by industrial chairman Les Ley.

Other uses permitted in the area should be readily convertible to industrial uses, the report said. It recommended the city take necessary steps to provide roads and utilities to make the area available for immediate industrial development.

"We recommend that Stokeley's and Neary's Lagoon industrial areas be eliminated and that the industries now operating there be limited to their present size and use by making them non-conforming uses," the report said.

The traffic ways final report followed basic lines of a preliminary report covered in the June 13 Sentinel.

Highlights and additional points presented last night include:

1. Aggressive action to secure the proposed "beach loop" and such bridges and structures as needed to move present and future traffic around the downtown area without inconvenience to residents of Santa Cruz.

1. Suitable new bridges be constructed to facilitate two proposed east-west trafficways.

3. Extension of the cliff drive from Aptos to Laguna creek, this and a walking trail being designed to exploit natural scenic values. No building should be permitted between the drive and the beach.

4. Study by city staff, followed by closing of streets not suitably located and connecting those segments which logically will meet future needs.

5. Reservation of a suitable, centrally located area for a heliport for passengers and cargo.
