

## Reeling Sain the Salmon

The season begins for salmon and local fishermen are taking to the ocean

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If Saturday was any indication, there could be a bumper crop of salmon this season.

More than 500 boats launched from Santa Cruz and Moss Landing harbors for the season opener Sat-

SANTA urday morning. Besides an overcast sky, the weather was perfect, with low winds and calm seas.

Anglers are now free to roam the waters from Pigeon Point Lighthouse, about 20 miles north of Santa Cruz, all the way to the Mexican boarder.

"It was a real good opener," said Larocean in his powerboat, Steppenwolf. "A lot of people got limits. ... Most peo-

ple caught fish. They looked a lot bigger this year — I heard there were some fish over 20 pounds."

Santa Cruz Small Craft Harbor worker Tim Morley said many people caught fish in the 12- to 15-pound

range, a good size for the time of year. Last year, sport fisherman caught about 97,000 fish, half of what was caught the preceding year. Although there were plenty of salmon, the bait went north and salmon followed, giv-ing Oregon-area anglers the best season in 20 years.

In two weeks, the Monterey Bay Salmon & Trout Project, a Davenport ry Wolf of Aptos, who cruised the fishery, will release 240,000 salmon into bay at Monterey and Santa Cruz harbors.
