# Ocean Lady To Bring Pacific Memories To SC

A cargo of Tahitian memories rides the sea aboard the Ocean Lady. Marv and Mel Mestre, new owners of the 44-foot motor sailer, will leave San Francisco tomorrow with a crew of 10 and expect to arrive here Saturday.

The Ocean Lady was well known in the South Pacific. Built in 1912 of solid cedar, she has a dining room, galley, main salon, master state room, full tile shower and sleeps 12.

Later this summer Marv and Mel plan a trip to Acapulco.

Verlin Brown, Sk1 (SS), was out fishing in the Honey this past weekend with his dad, Cecil Brown. Young Brown, just arrived from Pearl Harbor, is a mem-

ber of the Gold crew of the latest Polaris submarine the Daniel Boone, commissioned April 22 now on a shakedown cruise to Cape Kennedy.

The sub has two crews, the Gold and the Blue, each of which is aboard for two months, then relieved. The crew taking over flies to meet the 425-foot ship. Brown will board the sub at Cape Kennedy to come back to Vallejo. The home port will be Pearl Harbor.

Brown's wife Jerri and daughter Lori, 2, will make their home in Honolulu.

That new 37-foot Chris Craft Constellation named Shrimp's Efforts, at D-19, belongs to Mr. and Mrs. Russ Rolfe and son Gary, 11, of Sonora and Santa Cruz. The Rolfes have had a summer home on East Cliff drive for several years.

Rolfe skippered Shrimp's Efforts from Antioch Sunday in eight hours along with his brother Jeane Rolfe of Sacramento, Jack Rucker, Sonora, and Wayne Winther of Antioch. Rolfe said the water was rough through the Gate.

It's a little startling to look up 15 or 20 feet above the deck of the Cortship, D-12, and see Cort Snyder, 10, nonchalantly aiming his water pistol at anything below while he swings one way and another in a bos'n's chair.

Two of the boats were going on to San Francisco then up the San Joaquin river. One was Mr. and Mrs. Rex Pressey's 36-foot, German-built steel sloop the Hai Quai and the other was Capt. and Mrs. Overholtzer's 30-foot sloop the Taku II.
