

Lions, county join hands on Aptos park building

The Cabrillo Lions Club will build a community meeting hall in Aptos Village park.

The service club will provide the labor and the county the materials to build the 2,000-square-foot hall, which will be available for meetings and general recreation activities.

Santa Cruz County Supervisors Tuesday approved an agreement with the Cabrillo Lions who say the project will be completed by Oct. 31. Supervisors also authorized the transfer of county recreation funds up to \$25,000 to pay for building materials.

In other business Tuesday, supervisors:

—Passed an emergency ordinance eliminating the PD-planned development—designation from the Deer Park Villa subdivision above the salamander pond between Rio del Mar Blvd. and Rob Roy junction west of the freeway. The PD designation was apparently placed on the property without sufficient legal notice, according to supervisor Dale Dawson, who recommended that the planning commission hold hearings on whether the classification should be replaced.

—Accepted \$14,700 to begin planning and hiring personnel for the county-wide swine flu immunization program.

—Learned that it will cost almost a half-million dollars to improve 109 "inadequate bus stops" in the county. The county will seek state funding to build 10 bus turnouts as a first phase of a countywide project.

—Took a preliminary look at the 1976-77 budget for the county planning department. Supervisors will act on the \$1.35 million budget next month.

—Asked the state to make a

presentation to them on a proposed bicycle and walking trail between Seacliff State Beach and the Forest of Nisene Marks.

—Delayed until July a decision on whether they will give up efforts to regain budgetary control over the county Office of Education.

—Learned that there may be state financing available within a few years to begin improvements on freeway interchanges at Soquel Drive, near Dominican Hospital and 41st Ave.

They decided to talk next month about appropriating \$25,000 for a stoplight at the 41st Ave. interchange near the K-Mart Store.

—Transferred over a quarter-million dollars from various accounts to others, a traditional move as the fiscal year winds down. In the welfare budget, \$155,000—including \$129,000 state and federal funds—was transferred into the program of aid to families with dependent children.
