
Endangered species halt flood-control project

Q Bill of Watsonville is concerned about water buildup on Larkin Valley Road just west of Buena Vista.

"This time of year when the soil is saturated, almost any rainfall will send water into the road. It appears that what used to be a drainage ditch on the

south side of the road has silted up and has not been cleaned out for a number of years. The County Public Works Department is aware of this problem, because they post 'flooded' signs ... but I don't see that any effort has been made to improve the drainage

motorist that doesn't see the water at night and hydroplanes off the road? Any light that can be shed on this would be appreciated!"

A Taboo is correct, says Barbara Fulton, a supervisor with the Public Works Department. The problem is the road runs alongside a creek that is completely filled in by mud and debris there, she said. Fear of harming the endangered red-legged frog that calls the area home means the county is barred from removing the earthen cork, she said.

The county is looking for alternative ways to drain water from the road, she said. In the meantime, keep an eye out for flood signs.

Rule of the week

With the rainy season still hovering above us, here's a few tips should flooding occur:

- Avoid areas subject to flooding.
- Do not try to cross a flowing stream where water is above your knees. Even water that's 6 inches deep may be flowing strong enough to sweep you away.
- Do not try to drive over a flooded road. You could get stranded.
- If your car stalls, abandon it immediately. Many deaths occur when trying to move stalled vehicles.
- Do not sight-see or venture into areas blocked off by authorities.
- Avoid unnecessary trips during a storm. If it's necessary, dress warmly and tell others where you are going.
