

Week-end cowboys vie lassoing steers

The old hitching posts may have disappeared from downtown Felton, but that doesn't mean all the cowboys have gone from the scene.

Just take a ride to the Chaparral Corral, a rope's throw from the Felton Old Covered Bridge. (It's over a slight rise just south and west of the old span).

At the corral Guy Hacker senior and junior of Felton, plus some partners, are presently forming a team roping club. But roping of steers has actually been going on for a number of weeks on the week-ends, as the photos attest. These action shots were taken Sunday.

The new non-profit club is seeking members, according to Guy, junior. The fees will cover the cost of feeding the steers and keeping them in good repair, plus maintenance on the toping arena.

There is a \$10 per year membership fee, plus 25-cents per "loop". For non-members there is a \$2 per day arena charge plus the 25-cent loop fee. Prospective members may call 336-8153 after 6 p.m.

Presently the club has seven steers for roping, but will add to this number soon.
