## Parade-goers brave cool weather

The weather didn't cooperate. but everything else ran smoothly for the Watsonville Fourth of July Parade yesterday.

"This was smaller than last year. It was more fun," said Don Spence, chairman of the event for the last three years.

Seventy-two entrants participated this year, less than half of the 157 last year. Neither Spence nor others who helped organize the parade could figure out why the turnout was substantially lower; some guessed that would-be entrants might have stayed home to watch the World Cup soccer match, which started shortly after the parade.

It wasn't that this year's entry list was especially short - it was that last year's was so long.

The sun usually breaks out around 11 a.m., which was when the parade was scheduled to start, but it remained overcast. cool and windy throughout yesterday's event.

Despite the weather, a good crowd turned out, about the same as last year. People were three-deep along the parade



route, which stretched along Main Street from Freedom Boulevard to Second Street.

The entries ran the traditional array for Watsonville: floats, a few animals, kids on go-carts, politicians, hot rods and representatives from the ethnic groups that live here. State Sen. Henry Mello, D-Watsonville,

rode in the parade, then caught a plane to Sacramento to finish work on the state budget in the afternoon.

Several vintage fire trucks were in the parade, including one carrying Grand Marshal Gene Friend, a longtime reserve firefighter.
