Davenport Cash Store To Open

changing former whaling cen-ter and quaint town north of Santa Cruz, has taken on a new look with an attractive arts and crafts center going up on one of the town's main corners.

Burce and Marci McDougal's two-story brick edifice that will open in February will be a combination of a crafts retail store, pottery workshop, res-taurant and apartment build-

ing.

The structure was styled after buildings the McDougal's fell in love with while traveling in California's gold country.

"We spent years discussing what kind of building would go here," Marci said. "We spent a lot of time in the gold country and figured Davenport was like a frontier town, so we came up

with a frontier type building."

Despite its newness, the building has a sense of history to it with its 10-foot ceilings, windowed doors which practically make up the exterior walls, and second-floor exterior decking

The site where it sits, at the corner of Highway 1 and

Daveport, that seemingly un-langing former whaling cen-trand quaint town north of Store stood there from about 1905 until it burned in the early



When it burned down, much of Davenport's history went with it, Orlando added.

In commemoration of this general store which served Davenport customers for so many years, the McDougals have named their building The New Davenport Cash Store.

goods, but instead will concentrate on pottery created by local artists. This endeavor is nothing new to the McDougals who have operated the Big

It won't offer a variety of Creek Pottery school and studio for 11 years.

While shopping, customers will be able to peer through a window at potters creating their wares.

Marci explained that the idea for a retail store and production came about as the McDougals encountered many excellent pottery students who had no outlet for their work.

"Our graduate program is to get people out and work," Bruce added. "There are just not that many places for them to go. We felt we needed a place to get students working on a practical level."

He explained that the actual school will remain at Big Creek Pottery on Swanton Road, while the studio and production shop will move to the building. The potters' creations also

will be used in the small restaurant planned for The New Cash Store. The restaurant, Bruce said, will feature fresh vegetables grown at Big Creek pottery and homemade breads.

While the seven studio apartments upstairs currently are being rented, the McDougals eventually see the potters living and working in the same buildings.

Through the new building, the McDougals dream for Davenport has been realized.

It was a stoke of luck which brought the artistic couple to the area in 1966. They had been looking for a spot to start an pottery school when fellow potter Al Johnson told them of an old barn that might be available in Davenport.

The trio arrived in Davenport, only to discover an even

more desirable spot available up Swnaton Road. At that time, it was just a group of ranshackled old farm houses and barns.

Today, after much rennova-tion, Big Creek Pottery is an attractive collection of buildings in an idealic country setting. Johnson has since started his own studio down the road, while the McDougals have graduated more than 700 pottery students.

Over the years, many of these students stayed in the Davenport area and pottery studios and other crafts outlets have sprung up, giving the area a name for arts and crafts.

The McDougals explained they will display mostly Big Creek pottery at their store, but also will show work by other artists.
