Ways to save nearly \$1.8 million

SANTA CRUZ — Ways to cut nearly \$1.8 million from county departments that are spending too much or that aren't generating enough revenues will be presented to county supervisors Tuesday by County Administrative Officer George Newell.

The supervisors' meeting begins at 9 a.m. in room 525 of the County Center, with the budget-slashing proposal the first item on the regular agenda.

Newell's proposal is expected to include many cuts in positions.

Newell estimated in October that the county is facing nearly a \$5.8 million deficit unless cuts are made. The cuts he will propose Tuesday are the first phase of a two-part budget-cutting plan he has come up with.

A second round of cuts to make up an almost \$4 million deficit in general county revenues will be proposed by Newell on Jan. 4, 1983. Those cuts also are expected to include many positions.

Newell has said that about 10 percent of the 1,200 to 1,300 county positions will have to be cut to eliminate the deficit.

The deficit, according to Newell, is being caused by the following factors: A sudden decrease in the interest rates paid on county investments, an increase in the delinquency rate of property tax payments, reduce county revenues or increased costs due to the state and the continuing decline in the economy.

This will be the second time in a year the cou be faced with issuing layoff notices. At budget til summer, 135 positions were eliminated from the but only about 40 employees actually received notices.

The remaining positions either were already vathose holding eliminated positions were given other within the county.

But in this the next two rounds of budget cuts, positions cuts are predicted to translate into la because there are few, if any, vacant positions and f any, places within the county government to tra those whose positions will be cut.

Supervisors Tuesday also will consider several it concerning the Local Coastal Plan.

These include the following: An ordinance rez certain properties within the Coastal Zone (including Porter-Sesnon site in Aptos,) amending the zoning dinance to be consistent with the plan, adopting the Coastal Plan as part of the general plan and amendi land use program in the plan in reference to the log salamander habitat near Aptos, timber harves placing fill in the floodplain.
