LO School District On Single Sessions

Tuesday will be a "red letter" day for both pupils and faculty at Live Oak school—it's the day when double sessions end.

Superintendent Herbert Cartwright said the building schedule at the Live Oak school calls for moving day tomorrow. "It has taken on such an auspicious aspect we have dubbed it 'M Day'," he said, "and classroom equipment and instructional material will be moved then."

Also to be moved are administrative offices, but this will be done over a longer period of time.

The Live Oak school district building program included four new classrooms and one MR classroom.

Opening of them will see single sessions in the Live Oak district for the first time since the start of the 1962-63 school year. Shortly after that period began, the fourth grade went on double session. In the 1963-64 school year, double sessions were mandatory for first, second and third grades, and this year, double sessions have been held for first and second graders at Live Oak and first graders at Del Mar.

School spokesmen said the three new classrooms would eliminate the double sessions in the first and second grades at Live Oak and the one double session at Del Mar will be split so that the Live Oak school assimilates the children in the extra session.

The double session kindergarten classes are not affected in the move, Cartwright said. They will remain on a double basis, the same as they are in almost every other district in the county.

While the single sessions will be a boon to both pupil and teacher, the threat of more double sessions looms over the district for the 1965-66 year, Cartwright had warned. He said this threat, combined with the possibility of unification, makes passage of the forthcoming Live Oak district bond issue "a must if we are to provide adequate space for at least the end of that school year."
