UCSC Students Start Arriving

Some 300 University of California students are expected to "move in" today into their trailer "dormitories." The remaining 365 collegians who initiate the UCSC campus will arrive tomorrow and Tuesday.

Orientation week gets into full swing Wednesday as the freshmen and juniors of Cowell college go through necessary processing.

Tomorrow night, the new field house will make its official debut when the Affiliates of UCSC gather for their fall meeting. The program will feature a panel discussion on "Pioneering 1965: What Lies Ahead for UC, Santa Cruz?"

Panelists include the provosts of the first three colleges at UCSC—Page Smith of Cowell college, Charles H. Page of Stevenson college and Kenneth V. Thiamann of College No. 3 (yet unnamed). UCSC Chancellor Dean McHenry will act as moderator.

Admission is by ticket and only for Affiliates and their guests. The organization was formed in 1964 by persons interested in the growth and development of the local university. Membership is available by sending \$2 to P. O. Box 651, Watsonville.

All students will meet Wednesday at 10 a.m. for an orientation examination. At 1:30 p.m., they will take foreign language placement exams. They meet at 3:30 with preceptors in the field house and at 7 o'clock

there will be a faculty discussion of summer readings.

Thursday, there will be group discussions on summer reading assignments from 9 a.m. to noon. At 1:30 freshmen will receive advisement. Also, advance standing placement exams will be given in biology, chemistry and mathematics. That night, a movie, "On the Town," will be shown at 7.

Assignment to sections in certain classes and freshman advising will continue Friday. Special interest groups will meet at 1:30 p.m. Subject A exams will be given to those who have not met the requirements or haven't taken the test, at 1:30. Junior advising is scheduled also at 1:30. And deadline for enrollment without a penalty fee is 4 o'clock. "On the Town" will be shown again at 7, and there also will be games, informal dancing and a hootenany.

Hikes, campus tours and beach time are on Saturday's agenda, from 9 a.m. to noon. From 2 to 5 p.m. there will be a community orientation, sponsored by the university religious center, and swimming at Messiah Lutheran church. That night, students will visit the boardwalk.

Sunday, Chancellor McHenry will give a reception for all students and faculty in the field house from 4 to 6 p.m.

The following Monday, October 4, is the day that all the thought, ideas, planning and building will be put to the ultimate test—school starts.
